ARE WORKING TOOLS IMPORTANT? (Part one of four)

Are working tools important? If so, how can we use them if we don't remember what they are? If we do know them, do we know how to use them properly? In our Masonic Fraternity many wonderful lessons have been presented to us; also many working tools have been given to us symbolically to use. If these lessons are observed and the working tools applied in the manner in which we are taught to use them, we know that, when we reach the end of life's journey, we will be a better and wiser man; that we will have faith in the immortality of the soul; and that we will not be afraid to face our future existence. Should we neither benefit from these wonderful lessons nor use the symbolic working tools as we are taught, the chances are great that we will not be ready to make that transition peacefully but will be confronted with confused thoughts and fear of the unknown.

There are those Masons, who may ask, due to the fact they paid little attention when they were being initiated and not interested enough to find out later, what are the working tools of a Mason? Some may answer, the twenty-four inch gauge and the common gavel, the plumb, square and level and the trowel. Are these all? I should say not. "We should not however forget that these are not the only tools and implements used by operative and speculative Masons in the building of their spiritual edifices; all the forces at man's control, or subject to man's influences, are his working tools." "I am overwhelmed with the tremendous task of enumerating the working tools which are given to us, and developing their spiritual aspects. We are given a most concentrated capsule, over-flowing with an abundance of thoughts. Some few can be pointed out with a prayer that these might lead others to seek and find their own priceless jewels of thought for contriving a structure which is the immortal part of Man." And speaking of prayer, I cannot help but remind you that prayer frequently used in our business sessions as well as in the ritual of each degree. We do not hesitate to ask for guidance and help when needed, and so inform the candidate. He is told very clearly what to do and where to go for his help when he has exhausted all of his own resources. Yes my Brethren, prayer is one of the most useful tools at our disposal.

What is meant by eight hours for the service of God and a distressed worthy Brother? To me this not only includes prayer, meditation and helping a distressed Master Mason, but also working with character building organizations, the aged, the handicap, and the many others of this type that need our help.

Masonic Protocol

It is great to have new members coming in to our Masonic Lodges and appendant and concordant bodies, but imagine the bewilderment and confusion our new members, and perhaps a few old timers, have with all the names of officers in the various bodies and the titles used when addressing these officers.

First take a look at the chart in the dining room of Huachuca Lodge No. 53 that presents, pictorially, the structure of Freemasonry and appendant and concordant bodies. Just try to count all the various organizations, and the numbers of degrees. No doubt you will be amazed. The names of the various Masonic presiding officers include office titles such as Master, High Priest, Commander, Governor, Sovereign, Monarch, Shepherdess, Matron, and on and on. The matter gets more confusing when these individuals are addressed by members in a meeting by titles of address like Worship Master, Most Worshipful Grand Master, Excellent High Priest, Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Sovereign, Puissant Sovereign, Illustrious Master, and Most Illustrious Master. What gives? Is he Master or Worshipful Master? Well, both, depending who is speaking and who is being addressed.

Titles of address are composed of two parts, (1) the name of the office and (2) the honorific. Webster's Third New International Dictionary defines "honorific" as "... Conferring or conveying honor, the elaborate set of words used to people of rank." The incumbent of the office should identify himself or herself by the office name only. For example, "I am the Master of Huachuca Lodge No. 53." The individual addressing the presiding officer adds the honorific of "Worshipful" to the title of office as conferring or conveying respect the officer holder. It is inappropriate for the presiding officer to claim or to confer the honor upon himself. Imagine the unspoken thought process of a stranger or new member comes up to you and you identify yourself as, "I am the Most Illustrious Companion John Doe." The new individual may be thinking to himself words like, "...sounds to me like you are the most arrogant and pompous guy I've met lately." As a Presiding officer, always identify yourself by the office title only. It is the privilege of others to confer or convey to you the honorific of "Worshipful," "Most Excellent" or "Puissant."

Sounds simple? Well, there are numerous exceptions to the rules of protocol. For example, the York Rite Council of Cryptic Masons names its presiding officer as Illustrious Master, perhaps to differential that officer from the Master of a Masonic Lodge. The official titles of presiding officers in the Order of Eastern Star are Worth Matron and Worthy Patron. So the honorific of "worthy" is part of the office title. The York Rite Knights Templar state that the only title that should precede the name of a Christian Knight is "Sir Knight." However, the incumbent presiding officer is addressed as Sir Knight John Doe, Eminent Commander. A Regent of the York Rite Sovereign College of North America would identify himself as, "I am a Regent of the York Rite Sovereign College." The Regent should properly be addressed in a College meeting as, "Right Eminently Distinguished Brother Jon Doe." Imagine the awkwardness if the Regent John Doe introduced himself as, "I am the Right Eminently Distinguished Brother John Doe."

All of our Brothers and Sisters to have attained positions of leadership and distinction should be addressed properly and it is incumbent upon us to take the time to introduce them correctly. Let me introduce myself. Hi, you can call me brother.
