By Brothers, This month I wish to talk about our working tools. I addressed this last month, but feel that their usage and importance warrant further, and perhaps more direct discussion.

We receive detailed instructions on our working tools in each degree. Often the candidate cannot absorb the large amount of information presented so it becomes incumbent upon the mentor to fill in the blanks. If the mentor cannot or will not do this, the new brother is left with a large void in his learning. Just as often, those who have been “doing Masonry” for some time forget some of the details of their learning.

We learn in the first degree that the 24-inch gauge helps us ensure that we are appropriating time to each area of our responsibilities. It is understood that priorities change and thus our allocated time. We cannot under any circumstance completely ignore an obligation due to time. At the very least we must allow enough time to communicate so that responsibilities can be redistributed if necessary. Most recently, this has been apparent with our investigation committees.

The gavel in the hands of a work man ensures that unsightly and unnecessary parts of stone are removed. Failure to address these flaws could cause catastrophic failure of the building. The same applies to us. Despite an otherwise honest intent, our own vices or misconceptions (etc) can cause catastrophic failure within the Mason and by extension, his Lodge. A Lodge is not a building were men meet, it is the collective efforts of each individual within the building that create a Lodge. When one has a flaw, it affects us all. This is the time to whisper good counsel.

The Level at the station of the Senior Warden denotes equality. It is recognized that none of us come from the same tree; we bring many verities of income, education, capability, intent, and other measurable characteristics. Each of us should contribute (not just financially) to the welfare of the Lodge within the constraints placed on us while we grow as men and Masons in hopes that our contribution will also increase. When we start focusing on the ways we are better than another, we can lose sight of our own areas for improvement. While self improvement is the goal, it cannot and should not come at the expense of the order.

The Square denotes our moral compass or our sense of what is right and wrong in a given situation. Used effectively, a hand shake should never be required to confirm a deal. Our word should be enough to fulfill any contract. This applies to our obligation to each other, mankind, and the Lodge. When we have obligations to meet and we fail to meet them without communicating the problem, our square comes into question. Communication can solve and/or prevent almost every problem. If you have an obligation to meet, like Lodge dues, and cannot meet them, communicate with the secretary. If you don't, we have no idea as to your intent and cannot assist you.

The Plumb ensures that the vertical components of a building are true as intended by the architects. The same applies to us. We must ensure that our intent is clear in each and everything we do. Our work must clearly communicate this. When our work is sloppy or haphazard, our intent is clouded.

The compass delineates the boundary of our conduct beyond which we should never allow our passions or prejudice to betray us. This tool should admonish us that just because the US Constitution allows us to say just about anything we wish, it doesn't mean that we should. Words cut deeper than any blade and once spoken, they can never be recalled. The wound left by the sharp tongue often never heal. Therefore consider your words. It isn't that what you desire to say is wrong, but there are many ways to

say certain things. Some methods close doors while others open them. Our desire should be to open doors to communication and Brotherhood. Each time we close a door, we have alienated a Brother and hurt Masonry.

Huachuca 53 is doing very well in nearly every measurable way. We are growing in membership, community involvement, internal and external education, and participation. We are a shining example of Masonry in action. This is because of you. Many of us are doing our fare share or more of the work; others are doing little. I charge each of you to consider my words, evaluate yourself, then look into a mirror and ask yourself the following question "If every Mason in my Lodge was just like me, where would my Lodge be?" There are many areas the Lodge needs help with and several require no memorization or physical attendance. There is work for every age and physical capability. If you can do more than your doing, please contact the secretary and let him know the length of your cable tow. We have a job to fit and would really appreciate the help. Our biggest need involves making phone calls.

Thank you all for what you're doing, and continue doing. It is not me you are supporting, it is the Lodge. Your efforts will be reflected in the Lodge long after this year

Huachuca 53 Masonic Funeral Team

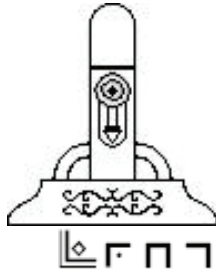

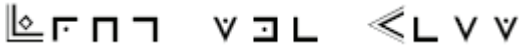

I would like to take this opportunity to share a little about project graduation and how important it is that we have made a donation to support the youth of our community.

In 1986, following a tragic graduation night accident, a group of concerned Sierra Vista, AZ citizens organized the first community sponsored graduation party for Buena High graduates. They provide a drug and alcohol free party for all graduates.

Project Graduation is a community sponsored event. Sierra Vista Sunrise Rotary coordinates the event and Sierra Vista Rotary Charities Inc. provides the tax exempt status and insurance coverage. The entire Sierra Vista community is responsible

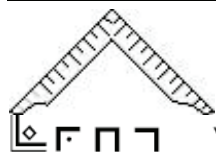
for the success over the years by their generous contributions of money, merchandise and time.

The mission of Buena High School Project Graduation is to provide a safe, drug and alcohol free celebration for all graduating seniors and their high school-age guest. The party is free for all graduating seniors and guests pay a small fee.

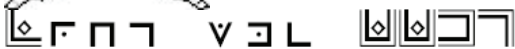
Food is provided for almost 700 people. During the night graduates and guest play various games and win "Buena Bucks". Graduates may purchase an item for home, recreation or school use in a mini department store using Buena Bucks. Buena Bucks are also used to purchase raffle tickets for other larger items, usually over \$100. The party concludes at 5:00 AM with cash door prizes of up to \$1,000. Only those graduating seniors still in attendance are eligible for the cash prize.

The success of the program has been the absence of alcohol related accident and incidents involving juveniles on graduation night (zero).

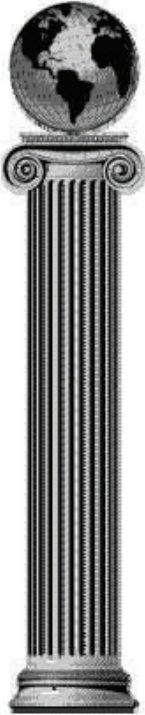

MASONIC EDUCATION



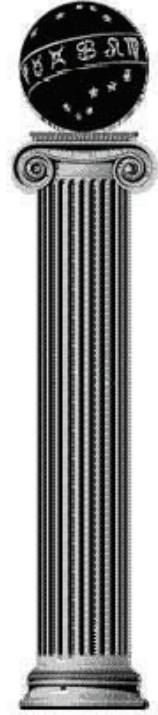
Another month passes, and I am humbled once again. I am reminded not just what Masonry is about, but simply what brotherhood is about. Freemasonry seeks to make good men better, but who among us can give me a prescribed method that may work for every Mason? This question is rhetorical. I find that my mind works quite a bit different from most of the brethren, and that is not a good or bad thing. We, as brothers, ought not judge, but instead seek. We must seek the perspective of our fellow brethren if we truly seek to grow in Masonry.

I must ask a fundamental question that has been ringing in my ears since the time I was raised. How is Masonry different from any number of charitable fraternal organizations? Additionally, what is my role and *how do I treat Masonry*? I hope that this question will not be received with any sort of malaise. I speak outside of the beautiful and reverent ritual work and more into what our extra-curricular activities consist of. I must ask you, are we tending the light of Masonry in our hearts and consciences?

Even in operative times, our ancient brethren gathered to dispense with usually business as we do in our stated meetings. But even our ancient brethren, to whom the refinement of their skills was at least a *third* of their effort throughout the 24 hours of the day, sought to further elevate their skills by good and timely counsel of their brothers. I must ask your indulgence for a moment while I consider Masonry as an chiefly intellectual pursuit. I cannot help but believe with every fiber in my body that our founding fathers would have no reason to be a part of this magnanimous fraternity unless it truly stimulated their intellect.

In an effort to answer the aforementioned question regarding the differences between Masonry and other fraternal organizations, I will say this; the belief in the existence of Deity poses no conflict of a scientific or spiritual pursuit and all of our studies in Masonry should bring us closer to Deity. My brothers, you do not need to have the intellectual prowess of Albert Pike to learn and teach your brothers. You need only the energy and courage to open yourself up about Masonic subjects. These subjects may include specific aspects of ritual and dual meanings therein. Additionally, you can discuss any number of topics to include experiential learning gathered in your lifetime and how it fits with a lesson in Masonry. It is through this exchange of ideas that we can grow from one another.

Now I may be out on a limb with this month's column but I can't help but feel it strongly. I am young both in life and in Masonry. I know how I treat Masonry and I know my weaknesses as a person and a Mason. I challenge you, and myself as well, to approach another brother Mason at dinner or in a proper place and really engage in disciplined discussion about something meaningful. I also have an earnest request of all my brethren: should I approach you with a question about something that perhaps you hadn't thought about do not take it as an affront on your intellect. I ask questions not because I want an answer, but because I want to learn about my brethren and the craft.

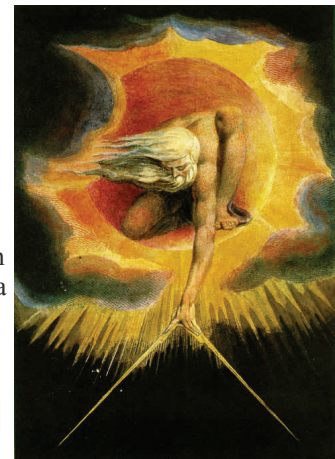
